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

General Instructions for the Visiting Officer

- I. Authority and Action:
The visiting officer shall be appointed by the Director General of Education, Kano State, to inspect and evaluate the educational institutions in the state. He shall have the authority to inspect all educational institutions in the state.
- II. Duties and Powers:
The visiting officer shall have the power to inspect all educational institutions in the state, to make recommendations for improvement, and to issue directives to the institutions visited.
- III. Functions and Responsibilities:
The visiting officer shall have the following functions and responsibilities:
 - a. Inspect and evaluate all educational institutions in the state.
 - b. Make recommendations for improvement of educational institutions.
 - c. Issue directives to educational institutions.
 - d. Report to the Director General of Education, Kano State, on the results of the inspection and evaluation.
- IV. Reporting:
The visiting officer shall submit a report to the Director General of Education, Kano State, on the results of the inspection and evaluation.
- V. The visiting officer shall be responsible for the protection of public assets, to safeguard against loss or damage, and to prevent waste of resources.
- VI. All documents obtained during the inspection shall be held in confidence, and shall not be made available to any other person without the consent of the officer.
- VII. The visiting officer shall be entitled to receive payment for his services, and shall be compensated for expenses incurred in the course of his duties.
- VIII. The visiting officer shall be entitled to receive payment for his services, and shall be compensated for expenses incurred in the course of his duties.
- IX. The report of the visiting officer shall be forwarded to the Director General of Education, Kano State, in the pre-specified format.




