



4. I am therefore, writing to draw your attention to ensure the success of this programme. I urge you to dedicate your time and resources and carry out all such activities as may be necessary to realize the objectives that we have envisaged while launching this programme.

5. I am sure that working together, through this programme, we will be able to bring about a discernible and positive change in the rural landscape of the state and leave an indelible impression on the lives of the people residing in our villages.

Mission Statement

In a first of its kind, the Government of Jammu and Kashmir has embarked on an ambitious and extensive programme of reaching out to the people at the grassroots level to create in the rural masses an earnest desire for decent standard of living.

The 'Back to Village' programme is aimed to involve the people of the state and government officials in a joint effort to deliver the mission of equitable development. The programme is aimed at energizing Panchayats and directing development efforts in rural areas through community participation.

As part of this programme, civil servants will have to reach out to each Panchayat of the State, where they will stay for a specific period to interact and obtain feedback from the grassroots so as to tailor government efforts in improving delivery of village-specific services.

The 'Back to Village' programme has been conceived with the objective of ensuring that developmental initiatives are built on the feedback and cooperation of the people, thus being more result-oriented with greater probability of success than those which are top-down.

The programme revolves around the concept that while the official machinery has to guide and assist, the primary responsibility to improve local conditions rests with the people themselves. Therefore, they must be encouraged to own a programme so that benefits are maximized.

The life of a person living in a rural area is not cut into segments in the way the Government activities are prone to be. The approach at the village level, therefore, has to be a coordinated, touching all aspects of village life. Such an approach has to be made, not through a multiplicity of departmental officials, but through Panchayats.

The essence of the 'Back to Village' programme is to emphasize the importance of ensuring right from the beginning, people's participation, not merely as an agent in the execution of the development works but as owners of the entire programme.

We hope this initiative will go a long way in achieving long term objective of grassroots democracy.

General Instructions for the Visiting Officer

- i. A suggestion by itself, techniques that have been presented to the visiting officer in which the members in the office to ensure that no action and necessary movement in the procedure and content of / discussed fully.
- ii. The officer shall participate in the Gram Sabha discuss the concept of Gram Panchayat Development Plan and plan for the Gram Panchayat to constitute Local Audit Committee whose the term has not been constituted even.
- iii. He/she shall make interactions with government officers, non-government functionaries, NGOs/other organization responsible owners of the area and the general public.
- iv. He/she shall visit local schools, colleges, institutions, besides important village assembly members related to various sectors.
- v. The visiting officer shall witness ongoing projects, inaugurated projects and shall participate in inauguration meets, conclusion of activities, etc.
- vi. The officer shall during all his interactions emphasis on education, nutrition and health of children, empowerment of women, gender consciousness, soil water management, organic farming, term-compromising non-violent functioning and water conservation.
- vii. The visiting officer shall assess the ground situation of visited Panchayat area from perception of local public, data provided by different Departments, inputs shared by the Panchayat citizens and his own observations.
- viii. Any conclusions drawn shall include a representative point of the general public. Efforts shall be made to bring out general highlights of the area based on conclusions.
- ix. The visiting officer shall remain formally himself from giving or offering any commitment on behalf of the government.
- x. The visiting officer shall adopt an unbiased attitude in reporting about.
- xi. The report of the visiting officer shall be submitted both physically and electronically in the pre-determined format. The officer shall exercise all care and objectivity while filling up the relevant form.
