Mission Statement

As a part of its work, the Government of Jammu and Kashmir has embarked on an ambitious and extensive programme of reaching out to the people at the grassroots level to create in the rural masses an earnest desire for decent standard of living.

The thrust to Village programme is aimed to involve the people of the state and government officials in a joint effort to deliver the mission of equidistant development. The programme is aimed at energizing Panchayats and directing development efforts in rural areas through community participation.

As part of this programme, civil servants will have to reach out to each Panchayat of the State, where they will stay for a specific period to interact and obtain feedback from the grassroots so as to tailor government efforts in improving delivery of village-specific services.

The thrust to Village programme has been conceived with the objective of ensuring that developmental initiatives are built on the feedback and cooperation of the people, thus being more result oriented with greater probability of success than those which are top down.

The programme revolves around the concept that while the official machinery has to guide and assist, the primary responsibility to improve local conditions rests with the people themselves. Therefore, they must be encouraged to own a programme so that benefits are maximised.

The idea of a person being in a rural area is not cut into segments in the way the Government activities are prone to be. The approach at the village level, therefore, has to be a coordinated, touching all aspects of village life. Such an approach has to be made, not through a multiplicity of departmental officials, but through Panchayats.

The essence of the thrust to Village programme is to emphasise the importance of ensuring, right from the beginning, people's participation, not merely as an agent in the execution of the development works but as owners of the entire programme.

The hope that visitors will go a long way in achieving long term objectives of grassroots democracy.

General Instructions for the Visiting Officer

1. A suggested Activity Schedule has been prepared by the visiting officer & will be incumbent on the officer to ensure that all activities and timings mentioned in the schedule are carried out/ covered fully.
2. The officer shall participate in the Gram Sabha, discuss the concept of Gram Panchayat Development Plan and also see the Gram Panchayat to coordinate Social Audit Committee in case the same has not been constituted earlier.
3. He/She shall also hold interactions with government officers, village government functionaries, NGOs/ social organizations, intellectual classes of the area and the general public.
4. He/She shall also visit schools, health institutions, temples, important shops, markets/ assemblies related to various sectors.
5. The visiting officer shall visit major long-standing projects, irrigation, playgrounds or any) participate in exhibition, melas, distribution of certificates, etc.
6. The officer shall during all his interactions emphasise on education, nutrition and health of children, empowerment of women, special children, water and management, organic farming, vermi-composting, rain water harvesting and other conservation.
7. The visiting officer shall assess the ground situation of all Gram Panchayats and have perception of local public data provided by different Departments, inputs obtained by the PDS/ government citizens and his own observations.
8. Any conclusions drawn shall include a holistic view point of the general public. Efforts shall be made to bring out general highlights of the area visited in consensus.
9. The visiting officer shall restrain himself/ herself from giving or offering any commitment on behalf of the government.
10. The visiting officer shall adopt an unbiased attitude in reporting views.
11. The report of the visiting officer shall be submitted both physically and electronically in the pre-circulated format. The officer shall exercise all care and objectivity while filling up the relevant form.

1. *Chlorophyll a* is the most abundant pigment in all photosynthetic organisms. It is a green pigment that absorbs light in the blue-violet and red-orange regions of the visible spectrum and reflects green light.

2. *Chlorophyll b* is a secondary pigment that absorbs light in the blue and orange-red regions of the visible spectrum and reflects green light.

3. *Carotenoids* are accessory pigments that absorb light in the blue-violet and blue-green regions of the visible spectrum and reflect yellow, orange, and red light.

4. *Xanthophylls* are accessory pigments that absorb light in the blue-violet and blue-green regions of the visible spectrum and reflect yellow and orange light.

5. *Phycobilins* are accessory pigments found in cyanobacteria and red algae. They absorb light in the blue and green regions of the visible spectrum and reflect red and blue light.

6. *Phycocyanin* is a blue pigment that absorbs light in the green and yellow regions of the visible spectrum and reflects blue light.

7. *Algae* are a diverse group of photosynthetic organisms that include green algae, red algae, brown algae, and diatoms. They are found in aquatic environments and are important primary producers.

8. *Plants* are multicellular eukaryotic organisms that are capable of photosynthesis. They are found on land and in aquatic environments.

9. *Photosynthesis* is the process by which plants and other photosynthetic organisms convert light energy into chemical energy in the form of glucose.

10. *Light energy* is the energy that drives the process of photosynthesis. It is absorbed by the pigments in the chloroplasts of photosynthetic organisms.

11. *Water* is a reactant in the process of photosynthesis. It is split into oxygen and hydrogen ions during the light-dependent reactions.

12. *Carbon dioxide* is a reactant in the process of photosynthesis. It is fixed into glucose during the Calvin cycle.
