## Mission Statement

In a bid to link the Government of Kerala and Kashmir, we initiated an all-India and extensive programme of reading out to the people of the grassroots level to create in the rural areas an earnest drive for self-reliance and self-help.

The 'Seek to Village' programme is aimed to involve the people of the districts and government officers in a joint effort to achieve the mission of sustainable development. The programme is aimed at bringing Panchayats and District Development Officers to work areas through community participation.

All staff of the programme and servants will have to work out to work with the people of the village, where they will stay for a specific period to monitor and obtain feedback from the grassroots so as to bring government officers in providing delivery of village-specific services.

The 'Seek to Village' programme has been conceived with the aim of ensuring that developmental programmes built on the people's initiative and participation of the people, thus being more result oriented with greater probability of sustainability. Forces which would otherwise be dormant will be activated.

The programme is based on the concept that while the official machinery has to guide and assist, the primary responsibility for improvement must be with the people themselves. Therefore, they must be encouraged to own a programme so that benefits are maximised.

The life of a person living in a rural area is not cut into segments in the way the Government activities are prone to be. The approach at the village level, therefore, has to be a continuous, touching all areas of village life. Such an approach has to be made not through an imposition of governmental officials, but through Panchayats.

The essence of the 'Seek to Village' programme is to empower the leadership of grassroots right from the beginning, people's participation, not merely as an agent in the execution of the development work but as owners of the entire programme.

Self-help initiatives will go a long way in achieving long term objectives of grassroots democracy.

4. He/she shall also visit schools, health institutions, disaster response camps, disaster shelter, etc. as and when required to visit the same.
5. The visiting officer shall visit their ongoing projects, especially development of any, particularly in microeconomic, distribution of agricultural, etc.
6. The officer shall during his/her visit emphasize on education, skill and health of children, empowerment of women, gender equality, good waste management, organic farming, water conservation, rain water harvesting and other important.
7. The visiting officer shall assess the general condition of children, especially ill & malnourished or sick babies, take photographs of them. Documented reports shall be the WHO programme officers and his/her observations.
8. Any conclusions drawn from this visit & further development of the general public shall be made to bring out general insights of the area based on Congress.
9. The visiting officer shall neither himself/ herself from giving or offering any donation on behalf of the government.
10. The visiting officer shall also be required to submit a reporting sheet.
11. The report of the visiting officer shall be submitted both physically and electronically in the pre-provided format. The officer shall operate all work and activities while staying at the assigned town.
