The maximum amount of water vapor that the air can hold is called the saturation vapor pressure. The saturation vapor pressure increases with temperature. So, the air can hold more water vapor at a higher temperature than at a lower temperature. The relative humidity is the actual amount of water vapor in the air divided by the saturation vapor pressure. So, if the air is holding half the maximum amount of water vapor it can hold, the relative humidity is 50%. If the air is holding the maximum amount of water vapor it can hold, the relative humidity is 100%. If the air is holding more than the maximum amount of water vapor it can hold, the relative humidity is more than 100%. This is called supersaturation. Supersaturation can occur in clouds, where the air is cooled and the water vapor condenses into droplets. The droplets are held together by small particles called aerosols. The droplets can grow and eventually fall as rain. The relative humidity is also important in determining the weather. High relative humidity means that the air is close to saturation, and it is more likely to rain. Low relative humidity means that the air is far from saturation, and it is less likely to rain. 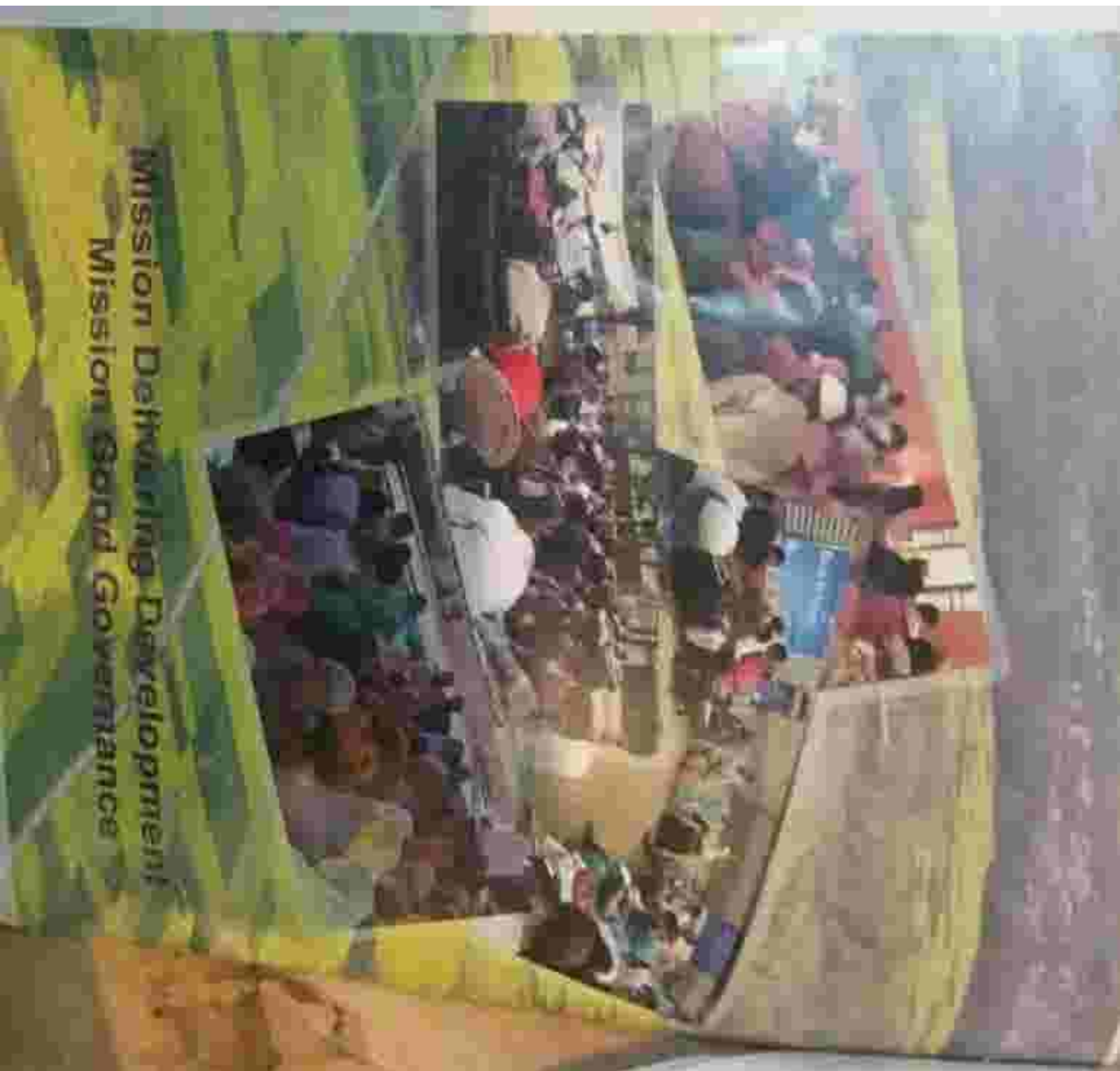
