Abstract: The purpose of this study was to determine the effect of a 12-week training program on the physical fitness and health of middle-aged women. The study was conducted in a community-based setting. The participants were 30 middle-aged women who were randomly selected from a local health center. The training program consisted of three sessions per week, each lasting 45 minutes. The sessions included aerobic exercise, strength training, and flexibility exercises. The physical fitness and health of the participants were assessed at the beginning and end of the training program. The results showed that the participants had a significant improvement in their physical fitness and health after 12 weeks of training. The study suggests that a 12-week training program can be an effective way to improve the physical fitness and health of middle-aged women.

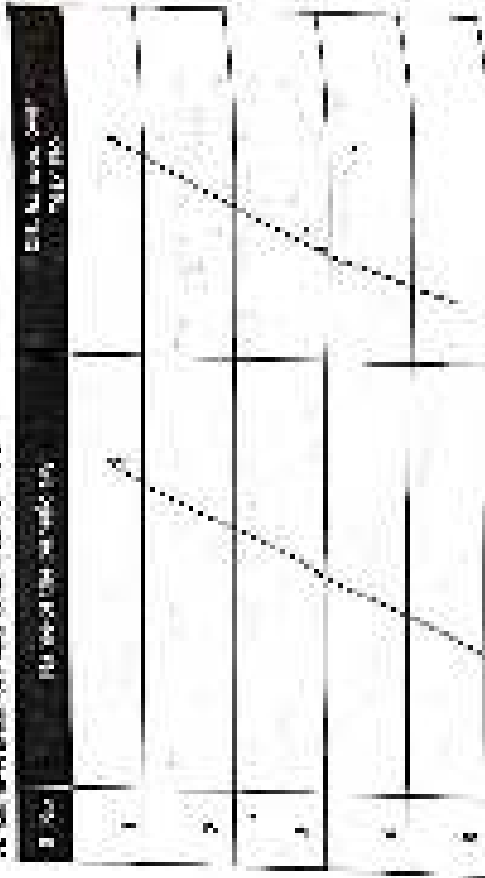
