Workshop on Rangeland Management for Sustainable Rural Development July 29-31, 2024,

Concept Note

The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) has designated 2026 as the International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists (IYRP). India has supported this proposal and co-sponsored the UNGA Resolution on IYRP (2022). IYRP addresses creating awareness on the importance of rangelands and pastoralists towards food security, economy, environment, and cultural heritage of nations. The goal is scientific conservation and management of rangelands and sustainable livelihoods of pastoralists through community participation. The member states of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCDD) and other parties have intensified the drive towards accomplishing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and turning 2026 into a transformative year for rangelands, pastoralists, and a healthy planet through IYRP 2026.

More than half of the land area on earth is made up of rangelands. In India, the rangelands, pastoralist communities, and livestock are intricately linked to and dependent on each other. Rangelands also contribute to ecosystem services, climatic stability, and biodiversity. About 30% of all agricultural carbon storage occurs in rangelands, which are a large carbon reservoir.

Jammu & Kashmir has rich biodiversity and extensive rangelands, particularly in the alpine and subalpine zones. In Jammu & Kashmir, 4.32% area of the total geographical area is rangeland (3.53% in Jammu and 13.22% in Kashmir) with an area of 9,59,500 ha and it is vital for the livelihoods of local communities, supporting pastoralism, agriculture, harvest of medicinal plants and tourism. They are characterized by diverse flora and fauna, contribute to the region's ecological balance, and support around 6,00,000 nomadic pastoral communities viz. Gujjars, Bakarwals, Chopans, Gaddis, etc. The pastoralists practice transhumance migrating from winter plains to high-altitude summer pastures with their goat and sheep herds and contributing to the state's economy by providing milk, meat, manure, and wool. However, numerous challenges such as overgrazing, climate change, and socioeconomic exertion lead to rangeland degradation. It has also been realized that rangeland's afforestation without community participation is not a scientific and practical way to mitigate climate change. Land restoration and climate action programmes must engage local communities and institutions to develop village development plans and implement government programmes like MGNREGA. Adopting such approaches in sustainable grazing land management, biodiversity conservation, climate adaptation measures, and livelihood diversification ensures the ecological health of these pastures while supporting the socio-economic development of local communities. A collaborative approach involving government agencies, scientific institutions, local communities, and NGOs is essential for the successful implementation of these strategies. In this context, the Department of Rural Development, Jammu & Kashmir in association with the IYRP Support Group of South Asia and NABARD is organizing a 3 days workshop from July 29-31, 2024 at Srinagar with the main objective of leveraging ongoing government programmes and schemes of different departments in different states for sustainable rangeland management. The workshop includes an inaugural ceremony, technical sessions (including the participation of experts online), and field visits.
